Traffic Safety Committee Update - Upcoming "Fenway Road Safety Survey"

Due to the expressed concerns of neighbors regarding speeding cars on Fenway Road, the CSCA Board formed a new Traffic Safety Committee this spring. The purpose of this Committee is to determine whether traffic calming measures are in fact needed for Fenway Road, and if so, which measures would be most effective and appropriate for improving safety. We are currently working with the Montgomery County Department of Transportation (MCDOT) to explore different options for any potential traffic calming measures on Fenway Road.

During the spring of 2016, the MCDOT conducted a traffic study on Fenway Road. We've



linked a key to the study and the study itself to our website homepage, www.carderockcitizens.org. The MCDOT measured the speed and volume of all vehicles that drove on Fenway Road between Magruder Mill Court and Still Spring Court for one week. After this weeklong study, the Montgomery County Acting Chief of the Traffic Engineering Studies Section, Mark Terry, wrote to our CSCA President, Jack Orrick, "[I]t does appear that speeds along the roadway are of concern." More specifically, Mr. Terry wrote: "Typically, when assessing speeds, we refer to what is called as the 85th percentile speed. The 85th percentile speed is the speed at or below which 85 percent of vehicles are traveling when unaffected by poor weather or other vehicles. The average 85th percentile speed for the weeklong period in the northbound direction was 30 miles per hour, and 32 miles per hour in the southbound direction." The northbound direction is

downhill and approaches a curve, the southbound direction is uphill and approaches the crest of the hill.

Also during the spring of 2016, the Carderock Springs Elementary School PTA Board unanimously approved a statement of support for safety measures on Fenway Road. This statement is also linked to our website homepage, www.carderockcitizens.org.

Next Steps: 1. Our Traffic Safety Committee is currently working with the MCDOT to explore all possible traffic calming options and their efficacy. We are also gathering more information on existing traffic calming measures on similar roads in Montgomery County. Once these options and examples are finalized, we will share them with the community.

2. We will conduct a neutral, fact-based survey to gather opinions of Carderock residents in August or September.

The survey will include questions on safety perceptions (among other things) because we recognize that our neighbors all have differing viewpoints. It will also include the full set of traffic data collected to date, as well as the sample photos and renderings of potential traffic calming measures. The committee is working with fellow neighbors who have professional experience with surveys: Nancy Everett, Don Goldberg, Catherine Remijan, and Greg Pinelo. Once the survey results are captured, we will share them with the community.

- 3. Later on in the fall, all neighbors will be invited to meet with the MCDOT officials to share comments on their possible recommendations.
- 4. Ultimately, the decision on the implementation, or not, of any traffic calming measures will be made by the CSCA Board.

We look forward to working with all of our neighbors on this important project in the coming months. Thank you all for your support! Sincerely yours,

Preschool Program at Adat Shalom

Kids Adventure Academy, which has operated the after school care program at Carderock Elementary school since 2010, and has been offering preschool programs in MoCo schools since 1997, will be adding a pre-school and daycare program in Carderock this Fall. The program will be located at Adat Shalom Reconstructionist Congregation which is located down the street from Carderock Elementary (7727 Persimmon Tree Lane). The preschool is accepting children starting at 6 weeks to 5 years of age. The school will open its doors on August 29, and will be open Monday through Friday 7 am to 6 pm. For children under the age of 2, the school day ends at 4 pm. Kids Academy will also be offering a toddler playgroup at Adat Shalom on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Kids Academy is eager to work with Carderock on any traffic concerns, and will be discouraging out-of-neighborhood families from using Lilly Stone and Fenway Roads.

The school is offering significant discounts for the first ten families that sign up early and additional discounts for Adat Shalom members. Donations:

Although you may think that passing on goods that can be reused may not be essentially environmental in nature, it is. You may be familiar with the mantra "reduce, reuse, recycle". This phrase means that an eco-friendly household first reduces the amount of items they purchase/accumulate, with the second best action to re-use in some way, and the third, to purchase items and their containers that are recyclable. This is the reason for offering stations at the Shady Grove Transfer Station ("the dump") where one can deposit metals, E cycling technological items, large rigid plastics, items toxic to the environment, used oil, and other items that are not collected in our weekly bins. To get ideas on how to recycle, or better yet, re-use items you would like to discard, check the website of the Solid Waste Department,(http://m.montgomerycountymd.gov/sws/how/). If you cannot find your item in the available list, you can type it in and someone will definitely get back to you with an answer, provided you also enter your e-mail address.

You will often see me posting periodical collections that I will be doing on the cs-chat message board.

I just finished collecting items for a Wider Circle, a non-profit that gets referrals from various social service and faith-based organizations so that they may furnish places to live for those in need.(http://awidercircle.org/). They also provide professional and personal training for their clients. Receipts are available if you request them to me.

I am also in favor of donating sporting equipment of all kinds to Leveling the Playing Field, likewise a non-profit that distributes donations of sports equipment to teams, coaches and recreational centers so that those who otherwise could not afford the equipment necessary to play or join a team, can do so. (http://www.levelingtheplayingfield.org/)

Vehiclesforchange.org provides their clients with reliable used cars and low-cost loans to purchase them. They provide training in detailing so that others can learn a trade, and will also happily accept more valuable vehicles that trained mechanics evaluate and repair if necessary and then offer to the general public so that the organization may continue its mission. We donated an old model but good condition car to them, and we received a lovely thank you note from the client herself stating that this enabled her to get to her job location so that she could provide for her family. Pick up is available .

And closer to us, on nearby Greentree Road, is the National Center Children and Families and the Greentree Shelter for Women. See a list of their needs at www.nccf-cares.org

You may or may not realize that many of the organizations, including many that come to your home, and many that have bins or trucks in parking lots, (there is one that is very close in name to the National Center on Greentree, or Planet Aid, and others), sell the goods that are donated and use that for their funding. Although there is nothing dishonest or deceitful about since they eventually get sold in developing countries, they do not go directly to those who live in our area, our county and nearby counties and D.C. who are in need.

Many of our neighbors have donated their usable merchandise to these organizations, and I do a periodic collection for both a Wider Circle and Leveling the Playing Field. You can check their websites to find lists for donations. You can also contact me via my personal e-mail to tell me that you have something to donate. Once I hear from enough people/have a sufficient number of items, I make a trip to those two that happen to be across the road from each other.

Natural and Homemade Insecticides

Instead of calling a company that indiscriminatingly sprays your yard and garden, thus killing many beneficial insects (lady bugs, praying mantis) and robbing our wildlife of their food, you may want to try one or more of the following. Unlike the companies that spray toxins on your property, which can then kill ALL insects and can also negatively affect your neighbors and what gets tracked into your own home, the goal with these is NOT to kill all insects. A healthy ecosystem requires beneficial insects, microbes and fungi in the soil that may get destroyed by the use of specific products, whether considered hazardous, controlled, or open for anyone to use.

You can purchase the following and much safer products: Neem oil, diatomaceous earth, Bt, Milky spore, Nicotine, Pyrethrum, and Iron Phosphate, but you might first want to try any of the following "home brews".

To suffocate mites, aphids, and thrips...mix 1 cup vegetable oil to 1 T mild soap, cover and shake. When ready to apply, add 2 tsp of this mixture to 1 quart water

To kill the above plus whiteflies and some beetles, just mix 1 ½ tsp mild liquid soap to 1 qt water and spray. Do not spray during the hottest part of the day.

Not an insecticide but more a repellent so bothersome bugs do not even want to be in your garden, are mixtures using garlic or chile pepper. For the garlic mixture, puree with a bit of water 2 bulbs of garlic (not cloves but entire bulbs) and let sit overnight. Strain into a quart jar and add ½ cup vegetable oil, 1 tsp mild soap, and fill the rest with water. Use 1 cup mix with 1 quart water to spray.

With chile power, use 1 T powder, 1 quart water, and several drops of soap. With fresh chiles, puree ½ cup with 1 cup water, add 1 quart of water, boil, cool, strain, and add several drops of soap to make a spray.

Yet another "recipe"...1 bulb garlic, 1 small onion, 1 tsp cayenne mixed to steep for an hour, strain, add 1 T soap and use full strength.

Good luck. Hope these work for you and don't repel YOU from your garden!
