

**Carderock Springs Citizens Association (CSCA)
Board of Directors Meeting
November 13, 2001**

The meeting started at 7:40 p.m. at the home of John Surr. John Carlson, Lisa Wilcox Deyo, Malcolm Stevenson, and John Surr attended.

1. Minutes

The Board approved the minutes of the October 9, 2001 meeting.

2. Treasurer's Report

The Board approved the November Treasurer's report. The Treasurer reported that the net from the house tour (and donation to Red Cross) totaled \$623.71.

3. Lilly Stone Traffic Calming and Sidewalk Project

Lisa Deyo reviewed efforts to contact County officials to follow-up on prior commitments (e.g., no progress on installing signage barring large trucks on Lilly Stone Drive, police speed monitoring). Deyo drafted an article for the newsletter reviewing efforts. Deyo agreed to draft a letter requesting the County to install the signs (as promised).

4. Persimmon Tree Road Sidewalks

Nothing new to report.

5. Kachina Lane/Synagogue

Malcolm Stevenson reported the synagogue has begun landscaping along Kachina Lane. Stevenson plans to discuss with the synagogue options for reducing unnecessary lighting in the parking lot.

6. Master Plan and Stoneyhurst Quarry

Stevenson updated the Board on the status of the Stoneyhurst parcel and zoning for the Master Plan and prepared an article for the November newsletter. On December 4 and 11, 2001 at 7:30 p.m. the County Council will conduct public hearings to consider the latest draft Potomac Sub-Region Master Plan. The CSCA has focused on the planned zoning for the Stoneyhurst Quarry and, in particular, has voiced its opposition to proposals which would include significant commercial retail development. Over the past several months, the West Bradley Citizens' Association (WBCA) has become heavily involved in the issue, expressing concerns consistent with CSCA. Residents of Clewerwall Drive also have become involved in this effort. WBCA has met with the MNCPPC staff responsible for the Master Plan draft, hired an attorney experienced in land use issues, and met with the site's owner/developer. CSCA, WBCA and Clewerwall met earlier this month to review the situation and plan lobbying activities before the Council.

The latest proposal, which is the product of these efforts, calls for up to 97 multi-family units on the 13.3 acre parcel with the stipulation that "commercial development is not recommended". This proposal contrasts with the prior draft, which would permit up to 80 units and 50,000 square feet of commercial space. The increase in the number of permitted units is effectively a tradeoff for the developer's agreement not to pursue commercial development. However, the wording of the revised plan still leaves open the possibility for future commercial development.

7. ARC/Covenant Matters

No matters to report.

8. Newsletter

John Surr distributed a draft of the November newsletter.

9. Leaf Collection

A resident on Fenway Road wants to organize a leaf collection for the community. Approval by residents is required before the County will agree to a leaf collection program. Muriel Ebbits is leading efforts to organize a leaf collection program for the community. The Board agreed to support the effort, as necessary, to bring it before residents for approval.

The meeting started at 7:40 p.m. at the home of Malcolm Head. John Carlson, Joyce Darilek, Lisa Wilcox Deyo, Malcom Head, Malcolm Stevenson, and John Surr attended.

1. Minutes

The Board approved the minutes of the September 18, 2001 meeting.

2. Treasurer's Report

There is no October report.

3. Flags

The Board briefly discussed recent incidences where U.S. flags had been stolen or vandalized. The Board decided that future incidences should be reported to the police.

4. Lilly Stone Traffic Calming and Sidewalk Project

Lisa Deyo noted that the County has not installed signs indicating that heavy trucks are prohibited on Lilly Stone Drive. Deyo stated that she is working with residents to survey options for sidewalk options. Some Board members had heard that a Ford Explorer has reportedly passed several school buses along Lilly Stone. The Board urged residents to record tag numbers and report violations to the police.

5. Persimmon Tree Road Sidewalks

Nothing new to report.

6. Kachina Lane/Synagogue

Malcolm Stevenson reported no new developments on the parking lot lights, but did confirm that the lights routinely stay on until 11 p.m. Stevenson stated that the synagogue is tending the strip along Kachina Lane. He has exchanged e-mails exchange with Anne Carlson regarding plantings and reiterated that the Association will provide matching funds as soon as the synagogue orders plants. The Board urged the synagogue to hire a landscaping company in order to guarantee the plants. The Board also urged the synagogue to follow the landscaping plan.

7. Master Plan

Stevenson updated the Board on the status of the Stoneyhurst parcel and zoning for the Master Plan. He noted that the West Bradley Citizens Association has increased interest in the zoning issue and has met with the owner and developer of Stoneyhurst, Bill Rickman. He noted that Rickman met with MNCCP and agreed to take out the objectionable commercial development

option, but requested an increase from 80 to 97 multi-housing units. Rickman appears interested in building upscale housing targeted to "empty nesters." The tallest building at the rear of the parcel would be six stories high. Board members expressed concerns about traffic from the increase in units. The Board approved a proposal to hire a lawyer to represent the Association. The Board agreed to explore the possibility of hiring Roger Titus for his expertise, role in representing West Bradley Citizens Association, and long-time Carderock-area residency.

8. Stoneyhurst Quarry

Stevenson reported that he met with Brian Porto of the Stoneyhurst Quarry. Porto demonstrated what the quarry has been doing with the berms. Porto agreed to give notice to the CSCA before embarking on significant changes to berms. Stevenson plans to review with neighbors regarding his discussions the quarry.

9. Signs and landscaping

After a brief discussion about the growth of the Stedman garden and visibility for cars entering and exiting the club, Stevenson noted that he would contact Martha Donnelly (designer) to discuss trimming options.

The Board requested more information on a request from Ms. Petche to hire a contractor to maintain the signs and landscaping around the entrances. The board plans to discuss the matter at the November meeting.

10. ARC/Covenant Matters

No matters to report.

11. Newsletter

John Surr stated there would be no newsletter before the next board meeting.

The meeting started at 7:40 p.m. at the home of John Surr. John Carlson, Joyce Darilek, Lisa Wilcox Deyo, Malcom Head, Malcolm Stevenson, John Surr, and Augusto Tono attended. Mary Lou Shannon attended a portion of the meeting.

1. Minutes

The Board approved the minutes of the July 25, 2001 meeting.

2. Treasurer's Report

Joyce Darilek distributed the September Treasurer's report and the Board approved it.

John Surr stated that the Cabin John Volunteer Fire Department is seeking a donation from CSCA. The board approved a donation of \$100 to the Cabin John Volunteer Fire Department.

The board also discussed donating funds to support the victims of the September 11th attacks on the Pentagon and New York City. The board agreed to donate the profits from the house tour to the American Red Cross. Following the meeting, Carlson researched and found a Red Cross fund designated specifically to the September 11 attacks:

3. Participation in MCCA

Darilek reminded the board that the Montgomery County Civic Association (MCCA) fees are due. CSCA has a right to designate three delegates who can attend the monthly meetings. Malcom Stevenson and Malcolm Head and either Lisa Deyo or John Carlson will be listed as delegates.

4. Lilly Stone Traffic Calming and Sidewalk Project

Lisa Deyo provided an update on efforts to calm traffic and options for sidewalks on Lilly Stone. Deyo reported that the county has not installed signs alerting trucks to weight restrictions (i.e., vehicles cannot exceed 20,000 lbs). Deyo announced that the latest County proposal is to install sidewalks 10 feet from the road, which would involve the removal of large trees and installation of retaining walls. This would change the character of Lilly Stone Drive and raise concerns with residents along Lilly Stone. Moreover, she noted that County Council would need to approve a proposal to narrow the street, due to concerns over access for public safety vehicles.

Deyo announced that she plans to withdraw as the lead of the CSCA's efforts to calm traffic and research sidewalks, but would work with the board to recruit others on Lilly Stone to continue doing research and advocacy work. The board asked Deyo to continue efforts to get truck signs

installed and to continue the board's efforts to encourage residents to stop at stop signs (e.g., license tag monitoring at stop signs), drive below the speed limits, and urge the police to enforce speed limit laws.

5. Persimmon Tree Road Sidewalks

Malcolm Stevenson discussed the status of the Persimmon Tree Road sidewalks project. He noted that the County planning board has agreed to include a bike path along Persimmon Tree Road in the master plan. The board endorsed efforts to install a sidewalk along Persimmon Tree Road.

6. Kachina Lane/Synagogue

Stevenson stated that he has not received any further update from Anne Carlson or the Adat Shalom Synagogue regarding the status of landscaping. He noted that neighbors also are concerned about the intensity and duration of the lights around the Synagogue. Stevenson plans to discuss the lighting issue with Adat Shalom officials.

7. House Tour

Mary Lou noted that the house and garden tour was a success with well over 100 participants. Joyce Darilek reported that the September 9th house and garden tour grossed \$879. Shannon recommended that the CSCA thank homeowners for opening their homes and gardens and concurred with the board's suggestion to donate profits from the tour to the Red Cross. The board suggested that next year's tour be in late September. Carlson agreed to draft a letter thanking homeowners.

8. Internet domain name

Shannon reported that CarderockSprings.org domain name does not expire until November 2002.

9. Stoneyhurst Quarry

Darilek noted that one homeowners abutting the quarry is complaining about truck activity along the berms of Stoneyhurst quarry. Darilek suggested that the quarry notify homeowners before working on the berms. Stevenson stated that he had previously discussed the issue extensively with the quarry owner, noting that the county has strict rules requiring the quarry to retain and store overburden. Following the CSCA meeting, Stevenson discussed the matter with both the homeowner and quarry management.

10. Signs and landscaping

Stevenson thanked Jonathan Graham for installing the pool sign at the intersection of Carderock Springs Drive and Fenway Road. He also noted that CS resident suggested that the Board pay a contractor to maintain signs and landscaping. The board decided to discuss the matter until the next meeting.

11. ARC/Covenant Matters

Augusto Tono noted that he plans to attend meetings (as the CSCA representative) to discuss designs for the renovation of Carderock Springs school.

Tono noted that the homeowners who submitted a proposal which included the extensive use of glass block and other details as dominate features, accepted the objections of the ARC and plans to submit another proposal which will address those concerns.

Tono also noted at the Luhde proposal was rejected and the Cosasco project for a screen in porch was approved.

12. Newsletter

Surr stated there would not be another newsletter before the next board meeting, unless something urgent comes up.

July 25, 2001**

The meeting started at 7:40 p.m. at the home of Joyce Darilek. John Carlson, Joyce Darilek, Lisa Wilcox Deyo, Malcolm Stevenson, John Surr, and Augusto Tono attended.

1. Minutes

The Board approved the minutes of the June 26, 2001 meeting.

2. Treasurer's Report

Joyce Darilek distributed the July Treasurer's report and the Board approved it.

3. Lilly Stone Traffic Calming and Sidewalk Project

Lisa Deyo provided an update on the county's traffic calming review. Deyo reported that the county plans to install new signs alerting trucks to the weight restrictions for Lilly Stone Drive (i.e., vehicles cannot exceed 20,000 lbs). The signs will be installed on Seven Locks Road and Persimmon Tree Lane. County officials also advised Deyo that residents should contact the companies that travel along Lilly Stone to make sure they are aware of the weight restrictions. The county also plans to conduct another traffic count in September. The Board plans to request that the county conduct at least two counts covering several hours. Deyo also reported on several options for reducing vehicular speed on Lilly Stone, including installing another speed bump and a pedestrian island. Deyo reported that a new county official has been assigned to cover sidewalk projects and that this may delay future discussions on the sidewalk project. Deyo also reported new information on the minimum county standards for the width of secondary roads with sidewalks.

4. Persimmon Tree Road Sidewalks

Malcolm Stevenson discussed the status of the Persimmon Tree Road sidewalks project (in Malcolm Head's absence). Stevenson received a draft article that CS residents could use to petition county public to support sidewalks. The Board plans to revisit the issue in September when Malcolm Head returns.

5. Kachina Lane/Synagogue

Malcolm Stevenson updated the Board on the landscaping project of the Adat Shalom Synagogue. To date, the synagogue has committed \$1,000 for trees (with a match of \$1,000 from the CSCA). The Board considered (but rejected) a proposal to advance funds beyond the amount pledged by the synagogue.

6. ARC/Covenant Matters

Augusto Tono approved a fence for a property on Hamilton Spring Road and a "bump out" for a house on Lily Stone Drive. Tono reviewed concerns the ARC conveyed to the architect of a

project on Hamilton Spring Road. The architect submitted a proposal that includes the extensive use of glass block and other details as dominate features, which would violate covenants. ARC rejected the proposal and asked for further options to evaluate.

In response to a query about how the ARC should respond to requests for names of architects who work in the Carderock Springs neighborhood, the Board suggested that Tono compile a list of architects who have worked on ARC-approved projects (with no ratings or any form of endorsement/recommendation).

Stevenson reported that Mr. Winston removed three cars from Park Overlook Court.

7. Potomac Region Master Plan

Stevenson reported that the West Bradley Citizens Association has asked the county to reconsider the proposal to permit retail in the master plan for the Stoneyhurst quarry parcel. The Board discussed community concerns (e.g., increased traffic and safety issues, impact on neighboring parkland) and options for mobilizing support from neighboring communities.

8. House Tour

MaryLou Shannon is leading efforts for the fall house and garden tour on Sunday, September 9.

9. Beltway barrier. State Highway Department reported that 19 owners of houses in the special beltway barrier zone voted in favor of proceeding with the planning phase of the project, which is sufficient to proceed with the planning phase.

10. Domain Name. Stevenson plans to contact Mary Lou Shannon to request that the registration of the www.CarderockSprings.org domain name be renewed.

June 26, 2001

The meeting started at 7:40 p.m. at the home of John Carlson. John Carlson, Joyce Darilek, Lisa Wilcox Deyo, Malcolm Head, Malcolm Stevenson, John Surr, and Augusto Tono attended.

1. Minutes

The Board requested one change to the minutes of the May 22, 2001 meeting before approving them.

2. Treasurer's Report

Joyce Darilek distributed the June report. The Board approved the report.

3. Lilly Stone Sidewalk Project & License Tag Program

Lisa Deyo provided an update on the county's traffic calming review and Lilly Stone sidewalk project. During the traffic calming study, the county observed a median speed of 29 mph on Lilly Stone Drive during the traffic calming study. According to county officials, this is not high enough to merit traffic calming measures. However, the county recorded a high volume of trucks. County officials noted that this high volume of trucks could be basis for increased enforcement of laws restricting heavy trucks on Lilly Stone Drive. Board members also discussed ways to coordinate with other Bethesda area efforts to raise awareness of pedestrian safety. Deyo plans to contact the county and request a copy of the study on trucks and to request that the county move signs warning trucks of the weigh limit on Lilly Stone.

As a secondary residential road, the county requires a minimum width of 26 feet. If residents agreed to a sidewalk, it would require a portion be built on the easement. Board members asked whether all residents that would be affected by the sidewalk would need to agree before the county installed sidewalks.

The Board decided to postpone discussion of ongoing efforts to record license tag numbers of drivers until September.

4. Persimmon Tree Road Sidewalks

Malcolm Head reported on a June 6th meeting to discuss a proposal to construct a sidewalk along Persimmon Tree Road from Avenel to MacArther Blvd. The Avenel representative asserted that all property owners along the affected portion of Persimmon Tree must agree to the sidewalk before the county will build it. The Board requested further information on this requirement because it could affect efforts to construct a sidewalk on Lilly Stone.

5. Kachina Lane/Synagogue

Malcolm Stevenson noted that the Adat Shalom Synagogue liked the proposal to provide matching funds (up to \$2,500) for landscaping along Kachina Lane. Stevenson noted that the

synagogue does not plan to install additional plans until September. The Board requested that the synagogue use the landscape architect plan developed by Martha Donnelly and to work with a company that would guarantee the plants.

6. ARC/Covenant Matters

Augusto Tono reported no new ARC matters. Tono reviewed the status of an addition to the back of a house on Park Overlook Drive. He also discussed a request to remove asbestos tiles at a resident's home in which he suggested that the homeowner discuss the matter to appropriate county authorities since it is not a ARC issue. Tono requested that Board members educate homeowners that it takes two to three weeks for the ARC to review and respond to proposals.

Stevenson reported on the status of efforts to remove cars on Park Overlook Court. Stevenson stated that Mr. Winston sent a letter to Stevenson on May 25. Winston stated in the letter that he plans to donate the cars to charity. Stevenson plans to give Mr. Winston additional time before contacting appropriate county officials.

7. Anderson Request/Potomac Region Master Plan

Stevenson noted that the planning board rejected Anderson's request to rezone his property.

The Board discussed at length future plans for the Stoneyhurst Quarry property on River Road. Stevenson noted that neighbors on both sides of River Road are slowly beginning to wake up to the issues. The Board noted that it would like to find a resident who would be interested in working with other citizens associations to monitor the issue and to coordinate with the Board.

8. House Tour

MaryLou Shannon is leading efforts for the fall house and garden tour. No date has been set.

9. WSSC Problem

CSCA agreed to send a letter in support of property owners on Lilly Stone Drive whose house sustained damage from sewage back-up problems. The property owners plan to draft the letter, which will be signed by Stevenson.

10. Pool Sign

Stevenson plans to install the completed pool sign it at the intersection of Fenway Road and Carderock Springs Drive.

May 22, 2001

The meeting started at 7:40 p.m. at the home of Malcolm Stevenson. John Carlson, Joyce Darilek, Malcolm Head, Malcolm Stevenson, and John Surr attended.

1. Minutes

The Board requested several changes to the minutes of the April 25, 2001 meeting (attached) before approving them.

2. Treasurer's Report

Joyce Darilek distributed the May report (attached). The Board approved the report.

3. Lilly Stone Sidewalk Project & License Tag Program

Malcolm Stevenson reviewed the status of discussions with county officials concerning the proposal to install sidewalks and a median on Lilly Stone Road. Stevenson expressed concerns over coordination between county officials responsible for sidewalks and officials responsible for traffic and roads. According to information provided by Lisa Deyo, the county sidewalk official stated that her office approves the installation of sidewalks if the CSCA approves of the proposal. However, Stevenson noted that its unclear whether county traffic officials have been consulted. To ensure adequate coordination, Stevenson plans to contact the traffic officials.

The Board decided to postpone discussion of ongoing efforts to record license tag numbers of drivers that run stop signs until the next meeting.

4. Persimmon Tree Road Sidewalks

Malcolm Head plans to represent CSCA at a meeting on June 6th to discuss a proposal to construct a sidewalk along Persimmon Tree Road from Avenel to MacArther Blvd. Representatives from Avenel and Persimmon Tree Road Associations also will attend the meeting.

5. Kachina Lane/Synagogue

CSCA discussed the status of efforts to landscape the area along Kachina lane and the Adat Shalom Synagogue. Members noted that Randy Anderson has constructed a berm along the border of his property on Kachina Lane. Stevenson stated that the synagogue has installed some trees and plants along Kachina Lane and the parking lot. However, a synagogue representative has indicated that they have exhausted funds for landscaping and will not install additional plants until the fall. CSCA agreed to donate funds to the Synagogue for the specific purpose of installing the trees and shrubs outlined in Martha Donnelly's landscape plan. CSCA proposes

that the synagogue establish a "matching fund" program in which CSCA would match dollar for dollar up to a maximum of \$2,500. Stevenson plans to discuss this proposal with the synagogue and with Ann Carlson as the representative of the neighbors bordering Kachina Lane.

6. ARC/Covenant Matters

No new ARC matters to discuss.

Stevenson said he contacted Mr. Winston of Park Overlook Court to follow-up on earlier conversation regarding the removal of unregistered cars in his driveway. Stevenson noted that has violated the timeline for removing the cars and requested that the cars be removed by the end of May; otherwise, CSCA will request action by the appropriate authorities.

Stevenson also noted that the neighbor who initiated the complaint requested that, as a matter of policy, future complaints be made confidentially. CSCA members discussed the pros and cons of establishing a policy of treating complaints confidentially and decided to apply a case-by-case approach. Factors to be considered include whether it's a plainly visible covenant violation and whether a confidential approach will discourage people from resolving conflicts directly.

7. Anderson Request/Potomac Region Master Plan

Stevenson noted that staff proposal for the Stoneyhurst Quarry property has been revised to permit condo units as an alternative to townhouses. MNCPPC staff rejected CSCA request that the zoning exclude retail space. CSCA members stated that they have not received much community input and will base CSCA activities on future input.

8. House Tour

In response from a request by Mary Lou Shannon, the CSCA agreed to sponsor a house and garden tour in the fall. MaryLou Shannon will lead this effort.

9. WSSC Problem

John Surr noted that a homeowner on Lilly Stone Road has requested that the CSCA send a letter to WSSC regarding a sewer problem near the intersection of Lilly Stone and Seven Locks Roads. The homeowner says WSSC has working on repairing a faulty sewage line that may have caused sewage to be discharged into Cabin John Creek. The homeowner claims that WSSC has not been cooperative and recommends that CSCA consider sending a letter to WSSC. CSCA members said they would consider sending such a letter if the homeowner prepared the initial draft.

10. Entrance Sign Clean Up

CSCA members cleared debris and mulched the main entrance sign on May 5. During the clean-up, the group removed several shrubs that did not survive the winter. Stevenson plans to discuss with Martha Donnelly whether the nursery will replace or reimburse for plants. Malcolm Head

painted several entrance signs and plans to paint the recently finished pool sign. Stevenson plans to install it at the intersection of Fenway Road and Carderock Springs Drive.

11. Request from Local Church

The parishioner of the Presbyterian church on Wilson Lane asked whether CSCA would publicize the church's efforts to recruit new members. The Board decided that it would not be appropriate to do this.

12. Beltway Barriers

No new information to report other than the residents of affected households have not received ballots from the state on the proposal to install barriers.

Annual Board of Directors Meeting
April 25, 2001

The general meeting was called to order at 8:05 p.m. at the Carderock Springs clubhouse. Those present included Board members Lisa Wilcox Deyo, Malcolm Stevenson, Malcolm Head, John Surr, Joynce Darilek, Pauline Rabin, and twenty-eight other community residents.

Important issues - Malcolm Stevenson outlined six important issues that were discussed by the Board during the past year:

- *Belway Barriers*: a formal presentation to the community by State representatives was scheduled for April 30. All were invited and residents of affected homes were especially encouraged to attend.
- *Potomac Master Plan/Anderson Rezoning Request*: Townhouses and/or retail stores are proposed for two of the three quarry sites in the Carderock Springs area: Stoneyhurst and Giancola on River Road. CSCA opposes retail development at these sites and instead proposes a park for Stoneyhurst.

The Anderson request to subdivide their property into seven sections will in all probability be rejected by the County.

- *Adat Shalom Construction*: The synagogue opened a month ago. Carderock Springs residents are advised not to use the short cut that borders on the Anderson property pending resolution of the dispute over access rights. Adjustments to the outdoor lighting at the synagogue are planned to lessen the impact on neighbors. There is a need for landscaping the perimeters of the area and the CSCA Board has agreed to contribute to this effort.
