Neighborhood Directory To Be Updated and Printed This Spring

The Board of Carderock Springs Citizens' Association (CSCA) has decided to outsource the printing of the 2019 neighborhood directory to AtoZ Directories, a local company that prints many of the school directories in the area including CSES and Whitman. They also print other neighborhood citizen association directories, including River Falls.



The benefits of the arrangement include potentially reducing the overall cost of the printing to the CSCA, the movement of our neighborhood database to a cloud-based system where individual households can update their information on-line, the introduction of a mobile app that will allow access to the directory information, and an arrangement of addresses in the directory by street number listings, as well as last name alphabetic listings.

Like under our current arrangement, residents will be given the option to opt out of either or both of the printed and the on-line directory. The CSCA will be snail mailing dues statements shortly which will contain a checkbox for residents to make this election. The statement also requests updates from residents, particularly e-mail addresses as the AtoZ Directory will require residents to use e-mail addresses to create individual accounts. Please return this form, with your annual dues payment of \$50, as soon as possible so the directory can be as accurate as possible.

Much of the cost of the AtoZ directory is defrayed by paid advertising. There is a form on page 11 of this newsletter for anyone interested in taking out advertising. Buy an ad to promote your business!

The directory will be coming out in the Spring. We will need volunteers to help deliver directories to each home in the CSCA coverage area so if you can assist, please let me know.

Montgomery County Quiet Skies Coalition (MCQSC)

The Carderock Springs Clubhouse hosted the MCQSC meeting on Tuesday, January 15th. Ken Hartman (Bethesda/Chevy Chase Regional Services Director) reported that the RFP for hiring an airspace expert together with Arlington was drafted, hoping to be issued soon. Councilmember Andrew Friedson stated that air plane noise and pollution is a concerning environmental issue, affects property value (tax assessment for the County) as well as quality of life for its residents, which he cares deeply about. Nina Weisbroth was optimistic about the Congressional support of MCQSC efforts with the expected increased influence of Rep. Jamie Raskin in Congress.

The number of Montgomery County residents complaining about aircraft noise increased during the last 6 months, however the number of individuals complaining decreased. News from the Environmental Committee

De-cluttering and organization seem to be have become virtues. The next time you have items which can be of value to someone, consider the following resources instead of discarding them. Also please pass on to dianekarlik@verizon.net your additional favorite charities or means to pass on usable goods for later inclusion in subsequent newsletters.

The best way to de-clutter starts with a premise: limit what you bring into your home and curb your shopping habits. Some folks prescribe to the “something in, take something out” method. Others try to conquer a space at a time and try to keep and reorganize meaningful objects (nostalgia, memories, beauty) while purging what is not.

Determine the “biggest bang” for your donations, rather than the ones that might be easiest. Check <https://www.charitynavigator.org/> to ascertain which charities you can trust and feel good about supporting. Useful alternatives include:

Sell

Craigslist, the ebay store (there is a shop to help you near Quince Orchard HS), Nextdoor list-serve, or the CS-chat yahoo group list-serve.

Donate Directly

Goods need to be in “dignity” condition, meaning free of large stains, tears/rips, and scratches.

DoKindWorks: This grass-roots local organization of mostly women (used to be called MoverMoms for those who have been local for a while) with a host of activities. Among them are legal refugee resettlement in apartments, also now expanding to include those families who had to flee without belongings from abusive relationships, and now get them settled into new homes. The group has to rent trucks and do lots of manual labor and is

sometimes low on storage capacity. I am personally active in this group, and should you have anything for a household you can contact me and I can store or arrange for a pick-up once we have enough space to fill and items to donate. Items needed include furniture, basic kitchen and bathroom items, toiletries, cleaning supplies of all types, rugs, wall art, closet supplies, all linens and towels, basic foods to start out, a “first meal”, etc. This group sets up the apartment so that the family can unlock their new door and find a well-furnished, nice looking, comfortable and safe environment.

A Wider Circle: One of our favorite local charities, A Wider Circle provides pick-up (with usually a months-long wait) or drop off of household items similar to the above for DoKindWorks. On a different model, however, their warehouse and personnel are provided to help those needy who are referred to rent vehicles themselves and come to pick up and select items they need in order to set up a household. This is a well-run, huge organization.

A Wider Circle also has a professional development arm that in their classroom trains the previous unemployed in various skills and budgeting, and then provides them with donated professional clothing to prepare them for interviews and work. Their set-up is so carefully done that it resembles a department store!

Bethesda Cares: local organization that cares for our homeless in a number of ways, providing personal care, food donations, and once again, everything needed for those newly-housed.

So Others May Eat: A similar organization to the above which helps to break the cycle of poverty and homelessness and change the lives of our most needy.

Vehicles for Change: If you have an auto to donate, this organization will pick up your vehicle and use it to train previously unemployed mechanics and detailers. VFC covers \$500 or less for repairs. The organization then offers free vehicles to those referred by social service agencies so that they can efficiently get to work when public transport is problematic. You will even receive a thank you note from the recipient!

Leveling the Playing Field: Sports equipment and clothing collected, repaired and organized to provide to teams that do not have the sufficient funds themselves.

Donate to a “Store”

Habitat for Humanity Re-store (Gude Drive) and Community Forklift (across the Beltway) will pick up building materials, household construction items, and even decorative items and furniture. They may require large loads and there may be a waiting list. They often require photos of what you are donating so that they can efficiently arrange for packing into their trucks.

There are many thrift shops that re-sell items that are donated...Salvation Army, Goodwill, Wagging Tails (Gude Drive, for animals), Montgomery County Thrift Shop (Wisconsin Ave, Bethesda) and more.

Home Pick-up via Truck

Often the easiest in terms of effort, however many of these (Purple Heart, Lupus Foundation,) can have high costs associated with their administration, and they sell merchandise for pennies to middlemen. Therefore, if you have the time and can spare the effort for the more useful and beneficial types of donations, I would certainly recommend those over this option.

Planning a renovation?

ARC Approval and Architectural Salvage

If you're planning a renovation to your Carderock Springs home, there are two important things to know before you begin work: Architectural Review Committee (ARC) approval for exterior modifications and architectural salvage for interior renovations.

EXTERIOR: MODIFICATIONS CONSIDERED BY ARC



As required by the covenants recorded against each lot in Carderock Springs, any outside modification or additions to the structures on a lot must be reviewed and approved in advance by the Architectural Review Committee. This may include, but is not limited to the following: fencing, sheds, exterior color schemes, and live, sound hardwood tree removal. The ARC is an appointed committee comprised of residents who are trained as architects/designers. The ARC meets on a monthly basis, generally the first Wednesday of each month, starting at 7:30 pm at the Club, to review applications and plans for exterior modifications to Carderock homes. Meetings are open to all residents.

Please submit an application and your plans for review to the ARC beforehand. Initially these can be early conceptual plans and then later on they can be construction drawings with specific elevations. The ARC can often assist homeowners with suggestions on design issues that have arisen with other homes in the past and possible workarounds. Details on the ARC submission process and the application form are on the CSCA website which also has a 20 page document of architectural guidelines that reflect the architectural standards the ARC looks for in exterior modifications, outdoor landscaping features and sheds. INTERIOR: ARCHITECTURAL SALVAGE. Tree Committee Updates



The CSCA Tree Committee provides approval *before* removing trees.
The committee suggests these resources when selecting *new* trees.

1. Casey Trees <https://caseytrees.org/tree-species/> is a terrific foundation restoring tree cover in the District of Columbia. Their chart of recommended hardy urban trees, both deciduous and evergreen, includes a wealth of information and pictures. Casey has also included some unusual trees that should be more widely planted. A quick google search can identify which are native trees.

2. Montgomery County List of Approved Street Trees. The county MCDOT <https://www.montgomerycountymd.gov/dot-highway/tree/TreePlant.html> provides the approved trees for the county's right-of-way strip. An edited version appears below. Remember that these trees are chosen primarily for their hardiness (surviving with limited room for root growth, snow and ice accumulation, salt, etc.) which is a consideration for homeowners as well, but does not directly address a tree's benefit to wildlife, 4-season interest, and other factors that are also important. Only deciduous trees are included (although some cultivars of the native sweet-bay magnolia can hold most of their leaves through the winter, and the native bald cypress is a deciduous conifer).

Latin names are provided to prevent confusion, but it, too, does not identify native species. The Tree Committee has indicated well-known native trees on this list by using (n) after the name. Mature height and width are highly variable and should be used as guidance only.

MAJOR TREES (Taller Species) will grow to a minimum of 40' at maturity.

3. Maryland DNR List of Recommended Trees

<https://dnr.maryland.gov/forests/Pages/MarylandersPlantTrees/Recommended-Tree-List.aspx>

This list appears to include only native trees, both deciduous and evergreen. The website also provides a coupon for \$50/\$100 off a tree purchase at certain nurseries. Since this list applies to the entire state, some additional research is recommended to determine suitability in our area. For example, the beautiful Eastern Hemlock is no longer recommended due to disease.

4. Rebates

- www.TreeMontgomery.org provides residents with free deciduous shade trees (no evergreens, at least at this time), after a site visit and approval. Currently there is a waiting list of approximately 1 year, but staff is working hard to reduce this time. They will work with homeowners to find the right tree for their site, and try to honor owner preferences where possible. Their website also provides helpful information and pictures of suitable shade trees as well as a few evergreens.

Other Tree Considerations.

Carderock's tree canopy is slowly decreasing as older and larger shade trees reach their useful life or are removed for additions, more sunlight, and other reasons. If there is room, homeowners should consider some of the larger shade trees which are beneficial to wildlife, the environment, decrease utility bills, and whose appeal will continue beyond the life of the homeowner.

These lists also include native trees that are more tolerant of wet soils (among them bald cypress, sweetbay magnolia, serviceberry, paw-paw (a favorite of George Washington) and river birch. This may be a consideration due to Carderock's drainage issues. There are many wonderful trees that may not be included on these lists; feel free to do some quick research on your own.

Farewell

Carderock's **Ky Ewing** passed on December 19, 2018 at Sibley Hospital, just days short of his 84th birthday.

Ky and Almuth have lived in Carderock for 53 years, having bought their first house, 8100 Glenmore Spring Rd in 1965 and moved to 8212 Fenway Rd in 1968. In 1980 they built 8317 Comanche Court where they still live.

Over the years Ky was head of the Carderock Springs Citizens' Association and the Potomac Valley league, tirelessly representing this community in numerous battles, among them the original legal case to give homeowners the right to pre-pay their mortgage without penalty, which became the norm. He fought the landfill on what is now Avenel; the regional shopping center plans for the Stoneyhurst quarry site, as well as the demolishing of Glenmore, the now historic Stone house, avoiding plans for dense development in the center of Carderock.

Ky Ewing was born in Texas, graduated cum laude from both Baylor University and the Harvard Law School, practiced law first with Covington & Burling, then with his own law firm, followed by an appointment as Deputy Assistant Attorney General, Dept. of Justice Antitrust Division. In 1979 he joined Vinson & Elkins as partner, from which he retired in 2003 after an extraordinary career in US and International Antitrust Law, International Water and Boundary Law, CAB Law, to name a few.

A Memorial Service for Ky Ewing will be held at 10 AM on Saturday March 30, 2019 at St. Francis Episcopal Church, Potomac, MD.
