Recycling Questions of the month

What do I do with containers that are made of mixed materials, such as a cardboard coffee can with metal lid attached?

The best environmental action is to cut them apart, and place the cardboard with paper and the metal in the co-mingled bin or with other small metals that you may collect for eventual recycling. One might also consider informing the vendor that you dislike this type of container and why, so that in the future, manufacturers might make it easier for us to recycle properly. In the event that you do not want to trouble yourself with this, place your container into the regular trash, where the cardboard would be burned and the metal extracted from the ashes. Note that in MoCo our trash is burned by the Solid Waste Department at the facility in Dickerson, and used for energy generation, and that we do not currently use our land-fill.

What do I do with paint?

I just received a personal confirmation that now ALL paint, latex and oil, is accepted in the "hazardous" area of the transfer station. It is offered to non-profits. No more need to dry out your paint!

More on BPA

The American chemistry Council site, FactsAboutBPA.org. states that the European Food Safety Authority recently reconfirmed that bisphenol A (BPA) in plastics poses "no health risk to consumers of any age group" and the U.S. FDA says "yes…BPA is safe". Read to hear about their conclusions. This issue has arguments/studies on both sides!

Not Just for Seniors, MeetUp Spring Program at Carderock Springs Clubhouse Tuesday, April 21, 2015, 2 PM.

We hope you marked your April calendars last month when we announced the following Montgomery County Historical Society (MCHS) program and that we will see you at the clubhouse!

The Life and Times--THE COUNTRY DOCTOR IN THE 1800s

Come hear Dr. Edward E. Stonestreet, as portrayed by MCHS's uber volunteer Clarence Hickey in period attire and his 1885 medical bag, tell us about life and historic times when he practiced medicine in Montgomery County from 1852-1903. Dr. Stonestreet served three tours with the Union Army during the Civil War; ministered to the poor at an almshouse on Falls Road; was a lay preacher in his church; and became the County's 1st public health officer.

Articles on Mr. Hickey's interpretations and reenacting have been published in numerous publications including AMA's American Medical News (he's not a medical doctor but plays one – sound familiar??), the Washington Post, The Beacon, and Bethesda Magazine to name a few. It is based on the speaker's 2009 biography **Send for the Doctor** which chronicles Dr. Stonestreet's medical education and 51-year medical practice of house calls and office visits as loyal family physician and surgeon responding to accidents and injuries serving in Rockville and the county.

Following his presentation, Mr. Hickey will step out of character to answer any questions you may have.
