Of Particular Importance to Families in the Carderock Springs Elementary School Community

All of us are probably aware of the narrow path that leads from the back corner of the playing fields of Carderock Springs Elementary School to Stone Trail Drive near Comanche Court. The path at Stone Trail Drive is not marked, and is difficult to see from the road. The path is used by many people in our community, and it is busy with students coming and going from school on school days.

Recently two students using the path while leaving school could have been hit as they rode their bicycles into traffic on Stone Trail Drive without stopping or even slowing down to look for automobiles. Luckily on this occasion neither of the children was injured. The school, the county, and the community should not, however, wait for a tragedy to occur before further addressing safety concerns related to the use of the path, particularly by our children.

In the meantime, parents, please constantly remind your kids to be very careful whenever they're walking or riding their bikes, wherever they are going. Remind them that having a friend with them may in fact be a distraction. And to all drivers: We know Carderock roads can be tricky, with hills, curves, cars parked in streets, and difficult to see entryways. The roads are becoming busier with car and truck traffic, walkers, and bicyclists, young and old. Please slow down, stay alert, and help keep our community roads safe for all.

While you are recycling your cardboard containers (like cereals) and cans (like soups), check for the little "Box Tops" that are printed on the tops or labels. The school collects these and since each is worth ten cents , the PTA is able to purchase hundreds of dollars worth of a variety of extra items not ordinarily within the budget. You can drop them off at the school yourself (there is a jar when you enter) or collect them and then place them in my mailbox (8027 Fenway) or with a neighbor who has kids at the school. They do not currently collect the "Labels for Education", a newer program, but I am saving those as well for the time when they do!

Smart phone apps

A few of these are free, others not. They will work with either/ both iOS and Android.

Please note: These have been recommended but I, myself, have not yet looked at or evaluated all of them....just a few.

The Environmental Working Group allows you to put their product databases in your hands when you shop. Use <u>Skin Deep</u> for cosmetics and personal care products, <u>Dirty Dozen</u> to find cleaner produce, <u>Food Scores</u>, to scan barcodes on foods and get ratings for 80,000 items based on nutrition, ingredient concerns, and processing level.

<u>The Good Guide</u> is similar—it lets you scan bar codes on over 170,000 products of all kinds—but here you'll get ratings for their health, environmental, and social impacts.

<u>Locavore</u>, which directs you to nearby farms and farmers markets, and tells you what's in season at the moment.

<u>Seafood Watch</u> will lead you toward the healthiest and most sustainable choices at nearby markets and restaurants.

<u>PaperKarma</u> is a quick way to reduce unsolicited mailings. Take a photo of a piece of junk mail, hit a button, in most cases, you will be removed from their mailing list. It does not work for "neighbor/resident at....address" and works best with credit card applications, magazines, catalogs and yellow pages. It does not work well with store or restaurant coupons.

<u>Waterprint</u>, calculates how much water your food, products, and daily activities consume and provides the awareness needed to make better conservation decisions.

Zero Carbon does the same for your carbon footprint. Track the global warming carbon emissions your lifestyle creates and take suggested steps to reduce it.

<u>Carma Carpooling</u> enables you to look for a ride going your way, and then message the driver. The app will even calculate your share of the gas money.

<u>JouleBug</u>, which offers tips to save energy, shows the money you'll save, rewards the actions you take in a fun competition.

One Small Act lets you set all kinds of environmental goals, suggests actions you can take to meet them, and tracks your cumulative impacts over time.

<u>Rippl</u> is similar, but this app helps you incorporate actions into your life by way of suggested routines, reminders, and more.

<u>Skeptical Science</u> instantly supplies facts on environmental issues.
