Beltway Expansion Planning Update

The release of the Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) is being delayed again. SHA is still aiming to close the public comment period by 7/31/20, which will leave communities with a fast turn-around for providing comments.

Anticipated NEPA and Procurement Schedules

- 6/12/2020: DEIS Publication (Notice of Availability) with the caveat that libraries and other public buildings where the DEIS will be available must provide access to the public.
- Mid to late July/2020: Public hearings (2 in Montgomery; 2 in Prince George's County) – with the plan to hold them on a Saturday, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday no less than 30 days after the Notice of Availability. SHA is looking at ways to supplement the inperson hearings with virtual hearings.
- 7/2020: Shortlist from Request for Qualifications for Phase 1
- 7/31/2020: Close of public comment needs to be 45 days after the Notice of Availability so there is no current plan to extend that beyond 7/31/20 as already established.
- 9/2020: Notice of Intent for 270 North NEPA (National Environmental Policy Act)
- 5/2021: Final Environmental Impact Statement and Record of Decision
- 5/2021: Final selection of Private Partner for Phase 1

Planning a renovation? ARC Approval and Architectural Salvage

If you're planning a renovation to your Carderock Springs home, there are two important things to know before you begin work: Architectural Review Commmittee (ARC) approval for exterior modifications and architectural salvage for interior renovations.

EXTERIOR: MODIFICATIONS CONSIDERED BY ARC



As required by the covenants recorded against each lot in Carderock Springs, any outside modification or additions to the structures on a lot must be reviewed and approved in advance by the Architectural Review Committee. This may include, but is not limited to the following: fencing, sheds, exterior color schemes, and live, sound hardwood tree removal. The ARC is an appointed committee comprised of residents who are trained as architects/designers. In normal time, the ARC meets on a monthly basis, generally the **first**

<u>Wednesday of each month</u>, starting at 7:30 pm at the <u>Club</u>, to review applications and plans for exterior modifications to Carderock homes. Meetings are open to all residents, whether you are renovating, planning to renovate or interested in listening.

Due to the Stay-At-Home Order by the Maryland Governor due to the coronavirus, the ARC may or may not meet in person at the Club June 3. If you are PLANNING A RENOVATION, PLEASE CONTACT THE ARC by email cscaARC@gmail.com for further instructions regarding your plans for review and approval. Applications can also be dropped off at 8009 Hamilton Spring Rd.

Please submit an application and your plans for review to the ARC beforehand. Initially these can be early conceptual plans and then later on they can be construction drawings with specific elevations. The ARC can often assist homeowners with suggestions on design issues that have arisen with other homes in the past and possible workarounds. As the project becomes more defined, homeowners should return for another meeting to review construction drawings with specific elevations. Additionally the ARC may make recommendations and want to see amended drawings and details.

Specifics on the ARC submission process and the application form are on the CSCA website which also has a 20 page document of architectural guidelines that reflect the architectural standards the ARC looks for in exterior modifications, outdoor landscaping features and sheds. 

News from the Environmental Committee



Our minds are currently on topics related to personal health and safety rather than the environment. However, these also may be times

when we further educate ourselves or mitigate some of the effects of overusing one-use disposable items that we currently purchase. We can spend more time thinking about planting our own vegetables, minimizing lawn to provide space for native species and plant pollinators, or preparing for practicing more environmentally friendly habits when we finally emerge from the lock-down.



And wow! Lots of rain recently, and thus weeds How to weed now in an environmentally safe fashion?

- Cut weeds at base, repeat when they sprout, eventually the plant will exhaust its energy and die
- Hoe them out when small
- Smother with clear plastic so sun can "cook" and kill them. White or black plastic is not as efficient or quick as the clear plastic is.
- Use landscape cloth, cardboard or several layers of newspapers, cover with leaf or other mulch, and dig hole to plant whenever you want
- Pour or spray with boiling water or vinegar
- Apply re-emergent corn gluten in the Spring
- Cook and eat (garlic mustard, lamb's quarters) but be sure you are identifying correctly
- Weeding is best and easiest after a heavy rain
- Do not leave soil bare...or you will be doing all of this again and again!



The weed Garlic Mustard is edible, plentiful in Carderock and easy to identify now because it is in bloom. It makes a great pesto!

Planting a "victory" vegetable garden : Considerations

- Choose favorites your family likes to eat
- Decide whether you will use seeds or transplants so do check the maturation/harvest date on packages
- Think replacements: Early Spring peas, then summer tomatoes, then peas again in Fall
- Think companion planting (tomatoes and basil, for example)
- Test soil or use quality mixes and use composted materials
- Plant flowers to attract pollinators that will also pollinate your vegetables

We are expecting the Cicada Brood X to return to our area in May 2021. While they are not biting insects, recently planted shrubs and trees are the most affected. Pesticides are not successful against cicadas, so please do not use those.

Suggestions include not planting any new shrubs or young trees for the rest of 2020! The brood will hatch in May 2021 so you don't want to plant then either. It is best to wait until Fall 2021. That is a long time away, so should you consider this but decide to go ahead and plant instead, you will need netting for use from May through June of next year.



Road Safety Thoughts

Reminders below on appropriate and safe walking not only during the pandemic while pedestrians keep 6 feet apart, but always. Some have not always felt safe on our streets over the past 6 weeks.

Roads are shared space. We still have vehicles on our roads, although there are fewer, and our roads are not reserved for pedestrians or bicyclists. Some little kids are riding bikes/scooters in the middle of the road and even around blind corners.

Walkers should face traffic so that they see oncoming vehicles approaching ... walkers should not be walking in the same direction as traffic. That means walking on the left side of the road. This way, it is safer for walkers and in addition we can all maintain distancing requirements.




Walk on the left side of the road, against traffic

If you are faster than those in front, you should alert others that you are passing and leave distance between. This could require you to cross the road but please return to the appropriate side again as soon as you can.

If walking at night with or without dogs, wear bright not dark clothing and with reflective gear and/or a light.

Experienced **bicyclists** should ride with traffic.

Exceptions would be small children on bikes who are accompanied by adult walkers monitoring them at their slow pace.

Ask household and landscape workers to park on one side of the street only, or at least not directly across from other parked vehicles so that nobody is forced Into the middle of the road, so that emergency vehicles can get through, and so we can maintain a distance from those accessing those vehicles.

These road safety thoughts are most appropriate for our more heavily used and wider Fenway, Lilly Stone and Hamilton Spring roads.
