Amendment to CSCA By-Laws – Tree Committee

The CSCA Board had adopted new Tree Preservation Guidelines in January that provide more certainty on the process of homeowners to request the removal of sound hardwood trees on their property – See

. In connection with the adoption of these Guidelines, the Board had voted to recommend

for approval the addition of a new Section 3 to Article II of the CSCA By-Laws that provides express authority for the appointment of a Tree Committee to review and approve or disapprove requests for removal of trees and provides a right of appeal to homeowners of decisions made by the Tree Committee to the full Board, and ultimately, the Association. This right of appeal currently exists in the By-Laws for decisions made by the Architecture Review Committee (referred to in the By-Laws as the Architectural Committee) on home improvement decisions. The language of the proposed amendment is set forth below:

<u>Section 3 - Tree Committee.</u> At such time and to such extent as the Association is empowered to enforce the recorded covenants in the Carderock Springs subdivision as set forth in the Declarations on file in the land records of Montgomery County, the Board of Directors shall appoint a Tree Committee composed of one or more members of the Association, who shall review, approve, or disapprove requests by residents to remove sound hardwood trees from their properties within the terms of the covenants (except in connection with the construction of external improvements in which case the approval of sound hardwood trees shall be made by the Architectural Committee). Decisions of the Tree Committee may be appealed to the Board of Directors by any member of the Association, and the Board of Directors shall establish reasonable provisions for notice and hearing with respect to such appeals. Any party to such appeals before the Board of Directors, may within thirty (30) days from notification of the Board of Director's decision, appeal such decision to a special meeting of the Association called in accordance with the provisions of Article IV, Section 2, hereof. Final decisions of the Board of *Directors, or the Association, as the case may be,* with respect to the aforesaid removal of sound

hardwood trees within the terms of the covenants, shall for all purposes be considered the official decision of the "Tree Committee".

Renumber Sections 4 – 6 of Article II accordingly.



Want to remove a tree?

The removal of sound hardwood trees from residential properties are subject to the original Bennett covenants.

CSCA Tree Preservation Guidelines require that for any hardwood tree located on a Carderock residential property with a trunk diameter of **9 inches or more** at shoulder height that is not dead or in an emergency situation, *i.e.*, immediate danger of falling on a house or other property or endangering personal safety, the homeowner must contact the Tree Committee

(cscaTree@gmail.com) for approval to remove the tree. The Tree Committee will seek information from the homeowner as to the reasons for removal, the species of the tree, whether or not an arborist has been contacted and other pertinent information. Following submission of this information, the Tree Committee will arrange a site visit to evaluate the situation. The Tree Committee will then make a determination as to whether or not the tree can be removed, or if alternatives to removal exist, based on various factors including safety, tree canopy preservation, screening or privacy, tree health, effect on neighbors and cost.

Planning a Renovation? ARC Approval and Architectural Salvage



If you're planning a renovation to your Carderock Springs home, here are two important things to know before you begin work: Architectural Review Committee

(ARC) approval for exterior renovations and architectural salvage for interior renovations.

EXTERIOR: MODIFICATIONS CONSIDERED BY ARC

Review Committee. This may include, but is not limited to the following: fencing, sheds, exterior color schemes, and live, sound hardwood tree removal. The ARC is an appointed committee comprised of residents who are trained as architects/designers. The ARC meets on a monthly basis, generally the first Wednesday of each month, starting at 7:30 pm at the Club (NOTE: due to the holiday, the April meeting will be APRIL 12 at 8:00 pm in person at the Club), to review applications and plans for exterior modifications to Carderock homes. Meetings are open to all residents, whether you are renovating, planning to renovate or interested in listening.

If you are PLANNING A RENOVATION, PLEASE

- Contact the ARC by email cscaARC@gmail.com
- Submit your Application for Property
 Modification with required plans and
 neighbors' signatures by dropping materials
 off at 8009 Hamilton Spring Rd.

Please submit an application and your plans for review to the ARC beforehand. Initially these can be early conceptual plans and then later on they can be construction drawings with specific elevations. The ARC can often assist homeowners with suggestions on design issues that have arisen with other homes in the past and possible workarounds. As the project becomes more defined, homeowners should return for another meeting to review construction drawings with specific elevations. Additionally the ARC may make recommendations and want to see amended drawings and details.

Specifics on the ARC submission process and the application form are on the CSCA website which also has a 20 page document of architectural guidelines that reflect the architectural standards the ARC looks for in exterior modifications, outdoor landscaping features and sheds.
