
What exactly is a "Bennett" knob?



Is it a rounded hill, a door or drawer handle, a radio button, or a flock of widgeons? MDOT does not have any

definition of a knob listed as a street type, like road, court, avenue, boulevard, circle, or street, etc... I wish we could interview our late CS builder/developer Edmund Bennett. He gave it another definition. The French word, cul de sac, means the "bottom of the bag" and captures the shape of

this cluster design, or his "knob".



When you drive down


Lilly Stone Drive, Park Overlook Drive or Court, and along Fenway, you will see many cul de sacs or "knobs" with reddish-brown park-like signs with names like Pine Hill, Fern Hill, or Laurel. We hope in the near future there will be a knob on Lilly Stone with a new name, based on the native American Piscataway dish of acorn mash, called "wiiwish" because in the center of this cul de sac or knob is a champion-like oak tree.

According to the document on the Maryland Historic Trust website, Carderock Springs, Carderock Springs South, and New Mark Commons are important and original illustrations of cluster development, which challenged the post-war linear tract housing.

Cluster development helped to promote contour and tree preservation, a well as lowering housing costs and to cause more efficient use of underground utilities. Ultimately it helped to foster more community interaction due to the proximity of the 3 to 5 houses situated along the

circle. And, Bennett with his architects, landscaped these "unobtrusive" knobs to preserve trees and reduce traffic noise.

These knobs were named after native trees/plants, like Holly, Pine, and Fern. Because Bennett felt that dead-end streets were "dispiriting", knobs were created



as "extensions of the streets" such that owners along knobs on Lilly Stone, Fenway and Park Overlook have numbered street addresses. Because there are houses located on either side of the knob entrance, the county labels them as corner lots with two front yards. https://montgomerycountymd.gov/goodneighbors/resources/files/faqs.pdf

Want to remove a tree?

The removal of sound hardwood trees from residential properties are subject to the original Bennett covenants.

CSCA Tree Preservation Guidelines require that for any hardwood tree located on a Carderock residential property with a trunk diameter of 9 inches or more at shoulder height that is not dead or in an emergency situation, i.e., immediate danger of falling on a house or other property or endangering personal safety, the homeowner must contact the Tree Committee (cscaTree@gmail.com) for approval to remove the tree. The Tree Committee will seek information from the homeowner as to the reasons for removal, the species of the tree, whether or not an arborist has been contacted and other pertinent information. Following submission of this information, the Tree Committee will arrange a site visit to evaluate the situation. The Tree Committee will then make a determination as to whether or not the tree can be removed, or if alternatives to removal exist, based on various factors including safety, tree canopy preservation, screening or privacy, tree health, effect on neighbors and cost.



Properties where the Tree Committee has approved tree removal receive an Authorization sign in their yard to communicate to neighbors that the tree removal has been approved.

Planning a Renovation? ARC Approval and Architectural Salvage



If you're planning a renovation to your Carderock Springs home, here are two important things to know before you begin work:

Architectural Review Committee (ARC) approval for exterior renovations and architectural salvage for interior renovations.

EXTERIOR: MODIFICATIONS CONSIDERED BY ARC

As required by the covenants recorded against each lot in Carderock Springs, any outside

modification or additions to the structures on a lot must be reviewed and approved in advance by the Architectural Review Committee. This may include, but is not limited to the following: fencing, sheds, exterior color



schemes, and live, sound hardwood tree removal. The ARC is an appointed committee comprised of residents who are trained as architects/designers. The ARC meets on a monthly basis, generally the first Wednesday of each month at 7:30PM at the Clubhouse to review applications and plans for exterior modifications to Carderock homes. Meetings are open to all residents, whether you are renovating, planning to renovate or interested in listening.

Please submit an application and your plans for review to the ARC beforehand. Initially these can be early conceptual plans and then later on they can be construction drawings with specific elevations. The ARC can often assist homeowners with suggestions on design issues that have arisen with other homes in the past and possible workarounds. As the project becomes more defined, homeowners should return for another meeting to review construction drawings with specific elevations. Additionally the ARC may make recommendations and want to see amended drawings and details.

Specifics on the ARC submission process and the application form are on the CSCA website which also has a 20 page document of architectural guidelines that reflect the architectural standards the ARC looks for in exterior modifications, outdoor landscaping features and sheds. Trash and Recycling

The next change for pick up will be in the Memorial Day weekend, when our pick up changes from Tuesday to Wednesday, May 29th.

Recycling

Recycling numbers can often lead to confusion. Recycling is not standardized, as some jurisdictions recycle nothing at all, some only the most common plastics 1 and 2, others practice single stream and mix plastics in with paper and metal, etc. The numbers in these triangles identify the types of plastics used in the item.

In Montgomery County, you may place all numbers EXCEPT #6, which is basically Styrofoam and items that look different from Styrofoam, but contain those same resins.



In reality, only a small amount of plastics gets recycled due to costs of preparation, transport, and manufacture of new products.

However, some plastics often get a second life.

One woman in Lewiston Maine started to realize how much waste she went through from singleuse plastics, so she decided to test herself with a New Year's resolution; to see how long she could stick with <u>reusing containers instead</u>.

The domino effect led to her opening GoGo Refill in 2019: a low-waste retail store aimed at refilling containers and bottles rather than rebuying them.

Then in Maine, bills have been introduced to provide funds to encourage reuse of plastic containers as above.

DIY Hint of the Month

Mildew and soap scum prevention spray for showers and shower doors. Instead of purchasing an item that may include additional chemicals, combine:

1/2 hydrogen peroxide
1/2 cup rubbing alcohol
1 tsp dish soap
1 TBS rinse aid
Fill with room temperature water (preferably pre boiled) to make 32 ounces.
Use every time the shower is used.

Leave out peroxide if you have colored grout. Add drops of essential oil (tea tree, peppermint, etc.) for a more pleasant scent.

These three programs have all found paths to scale, taking back old products, repurposing the materials, and selling repaired products at discounted prices. Collectively, they are creating a circular economy, and reducing the products going into landfills.
